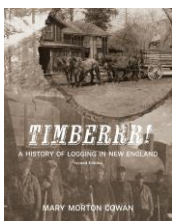


Can you match these words with their meanings?

Acid precipitation	unit of measure for lumber equal to the volume of a board one foot wide, one foot long, and one inch thick, or a total of 144 cubic inches
Azimuth	an oxen driver
Bio resin	a crawler tractor with sled runners in front, used to pull sleds of logs coupled together like a train
Board foot	a pole with a hook, (dog) and a spike at the end; a lumberman's basic tool for rolling logs. Sometimes called a peavey, after Maine blacksmith, Joseph Peavey, who improved the original tool
Broad Arrow	rain, sleet, or snow that has been polluted by acid chemicals
Bullwhacker	degrees from north. Two azimuth readings from different locations pinpoint the exact location of a forest fire.
Cant dog	nickname for a crosscut saw
Carbon neutral	a place in the woods where logs were piled, to be later hauled to a landing
Cookee	resins made from natural resources, such as tree oils. They are thick liquid substances and can be used as an adhesive.
Forwarder	a cook's helper, especially in a lumber camp
Inkslinger	Britain's policy of reserving large pine trees and prohibiting colonists from cutting them for their own use. It was resented by the colonists, and one of the issues that sparked the Revolutionary War.
Log hauler	nickname for a camp clerk
Misery whip	vehicle that transports logs from a cutting site to a landing. Logs are lifted off the ground, so they don't scrape the soil.
Teamster	a person who drives teams of horses
Yard	the condition when the amount of carbon dioxide removed from the atmosphere and the amount released into the atmosphere are in balance. It is sometimes called "net zero."



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
